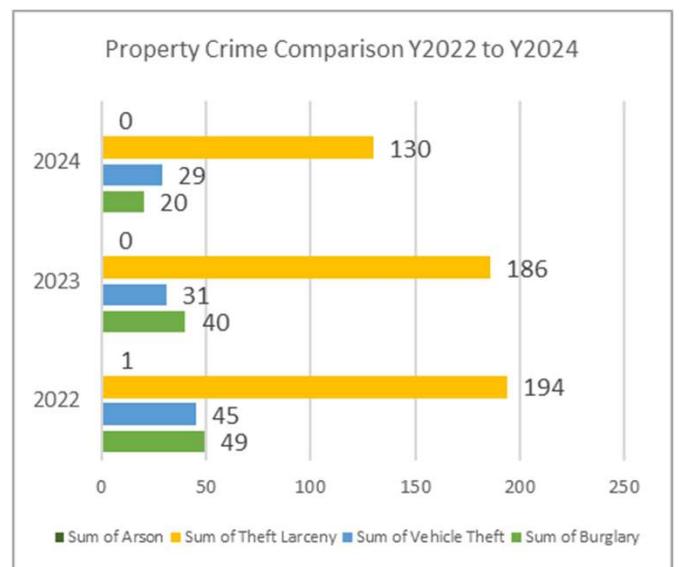
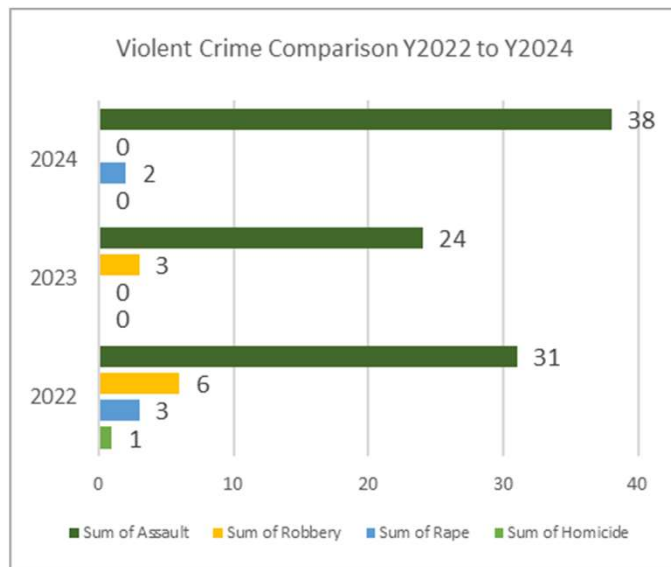


Calimesa

The United States Department of Justice (USDOJ), and the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), posts annual crime statistics in the Uniform Crime Report (UCR). These statistics are based upon law enforcement agencies reporting Part 1 Crimes. Part 1 Crimes involve circumstances that pose a clearly defined threat to human life or property. Part 1 Crimes include homicide, forcible rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, vehicle theft, larceny-theft, and arson.

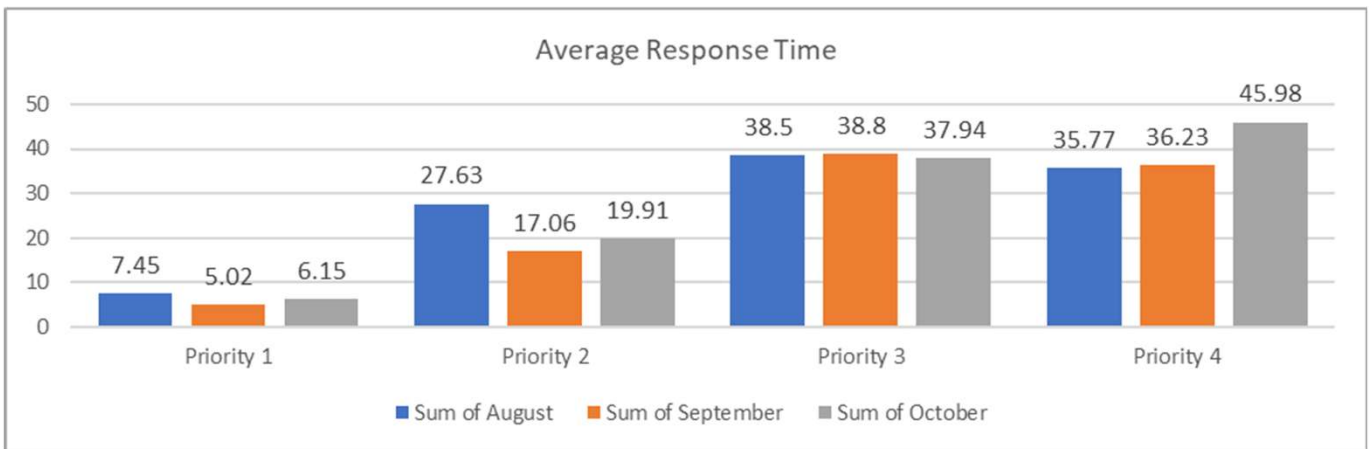

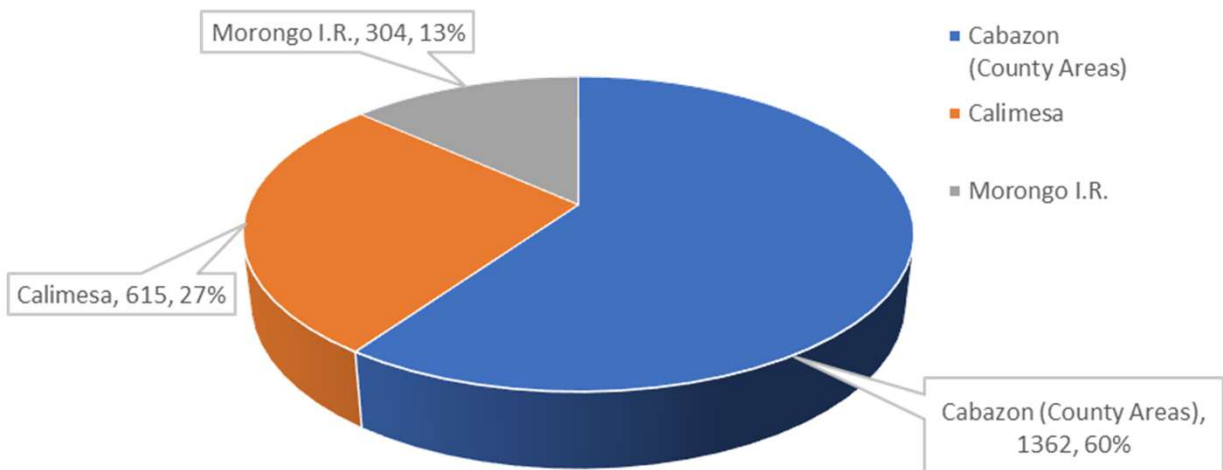
Priority 1: Involved circumstances that pose, or did pose in the immediate past, a clearly defined threat to human life or property and which involve a high level of violence or the potential for serious injury.

Priority 2: Involve circumstances of an urgent, but not life-threatening nature. They are generally disturbances with a potential for violence, minor assaults and batteries, etc.

Priority 3: Involve circumstances which are neither urgent, nor life threatening.

Priority 4: With the exception of several felonies, most past incidents are considered Priority 4.

Investigations Team

Cabazon Station Investigations and Evidence Bureau serves the city of Calimesa, Morongo Indian Reservation as well as a section of the surrounding unincorporated area of Riverside County. The Investigations Bureau is comprised of one Sheriff's Sergeant, and four Investigators, assigned to various specialties such as robbery, assaults, sex crimes, child abuse, property crimes, missing persons, runaway juveniles, domestic violence investigations, and Children Services Division/Adult Protective Service referral investigations.

Sex Offenders | Arson Offenders

The Cabazon Sheriff Station 290 Registration Unit consists of one Investigator. The Investigator is currently responsible for compliance checks of sex/arson registrants. The compliance checks are conducted each month.

The Investigator's duty is to conduct sex & arson offender (including Parole / Probation offenders) compliance checks, investigate related violations, conduct and manage PC290 sweeps, registration events, and assist investigators and deputies with complex PC290 investigations. In addition, the team is responsible for massage parlor inspections and massage therapist license checks. The team also issues massage & secondhand business operational licenses and conduct stolen property investigations with pawn shops.

POP | CSU Teams

Cabazon Sheriff Station Special Teams consist of a Crime Suppression Unit (CSU) and a Problem Orientated Policing (POP) Team. CSU consists of three deputies and POP consists of one deputy and one Community Services Officer. CSU actively investigates robberies, carjackings, thefts, and burglaries occurring throughout the area of the Cabazon Sheriff Station. The main goal is to enhance quality of life for residents by investigating violent crimes and to bring those cases to a successful conclusion by identifying, apprehending, interviewing, and arresting suspects. The POP team responds to a variety of calls from citizens of Calimesa that may fall outside the normal patrol function. POP conduct proactive investigations into narcotics trafficking, human trafficking, marijuana cultivation, vehicle theft and traffic enforcement with a nexus to Calimesa. POP works with businesses and residents to improve quality of life.

NOTABLE CASES & SPECIAL EVENTS



POP | CSU | Patrol

- October marks the beginning for the California Office of Traffic Safety fiscal grant year. Calimesa POP Deputy Hinkle had been working diligently the last few months to write and secure grant funding for the city of Calimesa. Calimesa was awarded grant funding from the state of California to conduct additional traffic enforcement operations within the city. The operations include DUI saturation patrols, Distracted Driving enforcement, and general traffic enforcement operations. This is the second year the grant was awarded to the city of Calimesa.
- On October 01, 2024, Calimesa POP Deputy Hinkle was assigned to conduct follow up investigation to a sexual assault which occurred at 7-Eleven on County Line Road in the city of Calimesa. The investigation included two female adult victims and a suspect who was an employee of 7-Eleven. During the investigation, Deputy Hinkle was able to discover the suspect was an immigrant from India. Deputy Hinkle was able to get positive identification of the suspect. The suspect went into hiding after the incident, but Deputy Hinkle was able to use resources and leads to discover the suspect fled to Fontana and was attempting to flee the country. Due to identification of the suspect and the nature of the crime, Deputy Hinkle filled an arrest warrant for the suspect, who refused to come out of hiding to meet with Deputy Hinkle in person.
- On October 9, 2024, Calimesa POP Deputy Hinkle and members of the CSU team participated in National Walk to School Day with Summerwind Trails School.
- On October 10, 2024, Calimesa POP Deputy Hinkle learned of report of theft and vandalism of political campaign signs for the upcoming Calimesa City Council election. A member of the CSU team took the initial report from two members involved. Deputy Hinkle assisted with the investigation, and it was learned a suspect had been seen taking down and damaging signs within the city limits. A third victim came forward regarding campaign signs missing throughout the city. The suspect refused to meet deputies in person, after numerous attempts to contact her at her residence. Charges were filed on the suspect.
- On October 29, 2024, Calimesa POP Deputy Hinkle was on high visibility patrol and conducted a park check at Creekside Park in the city of Calimesa. Deputy Hinkle contacted 6 subjects at the park. One subject was a transient of Yucaipa and requested homeless services. The subject was provided county operated services. Another subject was discovered to have 6 outstanding warrants out of San Bernardino County. The subject was arrested for his outstanding warrants.
- On October 30, 2024, Calimesa POP Deputy Hinkle and members of the Cabazon CSU Team participated in a Quality-of-Life sweep in the city of Calimesa during the hours of 0900 – 1500. During that time, 6 homeless individuals were contacted. One subject agreed to take homeless outreach resources. 4 Traffic stops were conducted for various traffic violations. All four drivers were cited for the violations. Two juveniles flagged down Deputy Hinkle and inquired about dirt bike safety. The juveniles were provided information on safety when riding the dirt bikes. One vacant residence check was requested by the property owner due to it having issues with homeless subjects taking refuge inside the residence in the past. No subjects were located at the residence. One subject was arrested for drug related charges.

CBAT



Community Behavior Assessment Team

CBAT is a cooperative agreement between RUHS-Behavioral Health and Riverside Sheriff's Department partnering a Clinical Therapist and Deputy Sheriff to assist with crisis mental health services in response to 911 calls. Services include mental health crisis assessments, attempt to divert those in crisis to the lowest level of necessary care, and link those people to outpatient mental health services in an attempt to reduce recidivism.
